


People released from prisons are denied:

## BY THE NUMBERS

More than 19,000 17-year-olds entered Michigan's adult criminal justice system from 2003 to 2013.

48% had a seducat

had a 10th-grade education or lower.

51%

had a substance abuse issue.

23%

had received mental health treatment

had no prior juvenile record.

## TROUBLED HOMES

A study of youth in adult prison from 1985-2004 found:

81%

had parents with substance abuse issues.

78%

had a friend who was killed.

78%

lived in a single-mother household.

48%

had a family member killed.


45%


had a father in prison.

spent time in child welfare or foster care.

The majority of illegal drug users and dealers are white, but 75% of people imprisoned for drug offenses have been black or Latino.

90% of companies

background checks

in hiring decisions.

About ½ million people were in prison or jail for drug offenses in 2012, a 1,100% increase from 1980.
